COOPERATIVE USE AGREEMENT FOR SIERRAVILLE SCHOOL (Recreation)

THIS AGREEMENT is made and is effective on this 2nd day of May, 2006, by and between the County of Sierra, a political subdivision of the State of California ("County'), and the Sierra Plumas Joint Unified School District ("District").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of California Clean Water, Clean Air, Safe Neighborhood Parks and Coastal Protection Act of 2002 (Proposition 40), the County has been awarded a grant pursuant to said Act and intends to make a grant application to the State to expend \$240,000 to provide additional recreation for the Sierraville and Sierra County as set forth in this Agreement. County desires to secure use of the gymnasium, outdoor playgrounds and certain other portions of the Sierraville School for use for community recreation purposes; and

WHEREAS, District is prepared to facilitate the use of portions of the school buildings and grounds, including the gymnasium, for community recreation purposes by entering into this Cooperative Use Agreement; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the parties that this Agreement will provide a right of use for County as the basis to secure and to utilize Proposition 40 funding to make improvements to the portions of the school covered by this Agreement to facilitate recreation; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of County that the recreation program and functions to be provided at the Sierraville School site will be managed and administered by the Sierraville Recreation Association ("Association"), a non-profit corporation to be formed under California law, as agent of the County. Improvements to be made to the School site will be made by County with funding provided by the State grant funds; and

WHEREAS, County will be responsible for compliance with all provisions pertaining to the expenditure and use of the State grant funds.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual obligations, covenants and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. Joint Use Cooperative Agreement.

This Agreement is shall constitute a Joint Use Cooperative Agreement" among and between the County and District. Pursuant to this Agreement, in consideration of the obligations and expenditures to be made by County to the Sierraville School grounds, County will be granted

a right of use of the School as described herein, to provide public recreation programs and recreation facilities to the County residents.

2. Right to Use of School.

District hereby grants County a right to use the portion of the Sierraville School, consisting of the gymnasium, kitchen, bathrooms, one classroom, playgrounds and parking lot, as more particularly described in Exhibit "A", as attached hereto and incorporated herein, for the purpose of providing community recreation. The portions of the School for which recreation use is authorized under this Agreement as described in Exhibit "A" shall be designated as the Recreation Area or Areas. Except when otherwise reserved for the exclusive use by County for recreation purposes, as set forth herein, District shall retain a co-right of use of the Recreation Area.

Except for fundraising activities that benefit the non-profit entity designated by County to manage and oversee the recreational use of the School Property, including but not limited to flea markets and similar events, no commercial use of the property may be made under this Agreement.

3. Schedule for Recreation Use.

The Recreation Area shall be reserved for the exclusive use for recreation activities by County outside of normal school hours and any special event activities that would otherwise conflict with public use. District may adopt and impose reasonable rules and restrictions governing the use of the Recreation Area so as to avoid conflicts with normal school activities and to protect the school property. The right of use of the School property for recreation purposes shall include the use of the parking areas customarily used by District for the parking of motor vehicles.

4. Improvements to Recreation Area.

In consideration for the grant of the right to use the School property and in order to facilitate the purpose of this Agreement, County shall, subject to the funding be provided from the "California Clean Water, Clean Air, Safe Neighborhood Parks and Coastal Protection Act of 2002", also known as Proposition 40 (referred to herein as the "Prop 40 Grant Funds"), make improvements to the Recreation Areas as generally described in Exhibit "B", as attached hereto and incorporated herein. It is expressly agreed that County shall not be obligated to make all of the recreation improvements shown in Exhibit "B" and may, in collaboration with District and Association, select which improvements are to be made with the funds available to the County from the Prop 40 Grant Funds.

Prior to making any improvements, County shall provide District a written description providing sufficient detail of the nature of the improvements, so as to allow District to make an assessment of whether the improvement adversely affects any portion of the School property. Improvements shall not be made without the written approval from District's Superintendent.

In making improvements to the Recreation Areas, County shall comply with the public contracting laws applicable to both the County and to District, including without limitation, public bidding and prevailing wage requirements. In undertaking the improvements County shall be deemed to be an agent of District for the purpose of compliance with any statutory obligation of District or its governing board.

5. County to Apply for Grant Funds.

Upon execution of this Agreement, County shall timely make application to the State of California for an allocation of Proposition 40 Grant Funds to make improvements to the Recreation Areas, in an amount of not less than \$240,000. The rights granted for the use of the Recreation Areas shall be contingent upon the County being awarded the Proposition 40 Grant Funds by the State for use under this Agreement. In the event that the State denies the requested funding, then this Agreement shall ninety days following the official notification of any such denial be automatically terminated, unless otherwise amended by the parties to extent same.


Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein, the District and County agree that this Agreement shall be construed and administered in a manner so as to effectuate County's obligations for the use of Proposition 40 Grant Funds.

6. Management of Recreation Areas and Programs.

District agrees that County may designate the Sierraville Recreation Association as the entity responsible for the day to day management of the Recreation Areas and Programs or may reserve to itself the responsibility for coordination of the recreational use of the School Property. In establishing and coordinating the recreational use of the School Property, County and/or Association shall be allowed to impose reasonable fees for participation in any recreation programs.

Nothing herein shall be deemed to confer to Association an independent right to use the School property including without limitation the Recreation Areas. The right to use provided for under this Agreement shall be to the County and not to the Association. The County's designation of Association to manage and oversee the recreation use and assignment of responsibilities hereunder may be rescinded and otherwise terminated by County at any time without cause. In the event that County rescinds or otherwise terminates the designation of and assignment to Association, County shall be entitled to designate a successor entity or party to provide such functions, or may undertake such functions by County.

8. <u>Insurance</u>.

- A. <u>Property Insurance</u>. The District, County and Association agree that the School property, including the Recreation Areas shall be insured against damage and destruction by fire, vandalism, and other perils covered by District. The District shall, in the event of the damage or destruction to the Recreation Areas (as a part of the School Property) promptly repair or replace the damaged facilities; provided however, should District determine that it is impracticable to repair or replace all or any part of the Recreation Areas damaged or destroyed which areas where improved by County under the provisions of this Agreement, then in such an event the District shall be obligated to reimburse County for the funds expended for the improvements as to any such areas.
- B. <u>Liability Insurance</u>. The District and the County both agree to purchase and to maintain, during the term of this Agreement, at their respective expense, a policy or policies of comprehensive liability insurance, including public liability and property damage in the amount of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for property damage and One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence for personal injuries or deaths of persons arising from their conduct and activities under this Agreement. Said insurance requirements may be satisfied by participation in insurance pools provided by joint powers entities. To the extent allowed under the provisions of any insurance contract or the insurance pools participated in by County, County's insurance shall include coverage of the activities of the Association who shall be named as a co-insured. In the event that County is unable or otherwise does not provide insurance coverage for Association and its activities under this Agreement, then Association shall be required to purchase and to maintain a separate policy of comprehensive liability insurance, including public liability and property damage in the amounts as set forth above.

9. Indemnification.

In accordance with the provisions of Government Code sections 895.4, 895.6, and 6508.1 District, County and the Association each agree to indemnify and hold each other and their respective officers, employees, and agents harmless from any and all expense and liability for damage, actual or alleged, to persons or property arising out of or resulting from negligent acts or omissions or willful misconduct of the indemnifying party or its officers, employees, or agents.

In addition, the County and the Association agree to indemnify and hold District and its officers, employees, and agents harmless from any and all expense and liability for damage, actual or alleged, to persons or property arising by or from any cause whatsoever arising from or connected with the use of the Recreation Areas when used for recreation purposes during the times designated in Exhibit "B", excepting therefrom any injuries or damage arising out of or resulting from negligent acts or omissions or willful misconduct of the District or its officers, employees, or agents.

10. **Dispute Resolution**.

The District, County and Association agree that they shall attempt to resolve any disputes under this Agreement through non-binding mediation. In the event that mediation is not successful the parties agree to submit the resolution to arbitration

11. Entire Agreement.

This Agreement and all exhibits, addenda, schedules, and agreements referred to in this Agreement constitute the final, complete, and exclusive statement of the terms of the Agreement between and among the PARTIES and SPJUSD and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous understandings or agreements of the PARTIES and SPJUSD. No PARTY or SPJUSD has been induced to enter into this Agreement by, and no PARTY or SPJUSD is relying on, any representation or warranty outside those expressly set forth in this Agreement

12. Exhibits.

The Exhibits attached to this Agreement are a part of this Agreement and are incorporated into this Agreement by reference.

13. Partial Invalidity.

If a court or arbitrator of competent jurisdiction holds any Agreement clause to be invalid or unenforceable in whole or in part for any reason, the validity and enforceability of the remaining clauses, or portions of them, shall not be affected unless an essential purpose of this Agreement would be defeated by loss of the invalid or unenforceable provision.

14. Governing Law.

This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Agreement shall be deemed to be inserted, and this contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included, and if through mistake or otherwise any provision is not inserted or is not correctly inserted, upon application of either party the contract shall be amended to make the insertion or correction. All references to statutes and regulations shall include all amendments, replacements, and enactments on the subject which are in effect as of the date of this Agreement and any later changes which do not materially and substantially alter the positions of the PARTIES and SPJUSD.

15. Notices.

Any notice to be given or other document to be delivered by party to any other hereunder shall be in writing and delivered to that party personally or by depositing same in the United States mail, duly certified, with postage thereon fully prepaid and addressed to the party.

16. Force Majeure Specific Exceptions.

The time for performance of an obligation other than the payment of money under this Agreement shall be extended for the period during which a party is prevented from performing by acts of God, government, or other force or event beyond the reasonable control of that party.

17. Execution.

This Agreement may be executed by each party on a separate copy thereof with the same force and effect as though all parties executed a single original copy. The collection of such separately executed copies shall be treated as a single copy executed by all such executing agencies.

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

AMENDMENT TO COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO THE SIERRAVILLE SCHOOL

This agreement amendment is made and is effective by and between the County of Sierra, a political subdivision of the State of California ("County") and the Sierra Plumas Joint Unified School District ("District"), collectively the parties, and is intended to amend the original agreement between the parties dated May 2, 2006 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement No. 060103.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of "The Safe Neighborhood Parks, Clean Water, Clean Air, and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2002" (Proposition 40), the County of Sierra has been awarded a per capita grant to provide additional recreation in Sierra County; and,

WHEREAS, the County of Sierra and the Sierra Plumas Joint Unified School District have in full force and effect, an existing agreement referenced as Sierra County Agreement 060103 dated May 2, 2006 to facilitate the use of State Park Bond Act per-capita funding from the 2000 State Park Bond Act for the Sierraville School Recreation Project; and,

WHEREAS, the California Department of Parks and Recreation Grants and Local Services has land tenure requirements which must be included with the land tenure agreement in order to gain funding approval and construction authorization.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual obligations, covenants and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree to additional provisions as follows:

- District shall at all time retain ownership and possession of the facility. County shall assume responsibility for operations and maintenance of the recreation facilities for the term of this agreement. For the purpose of this provision the County's maintenance responsibility shall include customary day to day maintenance responsibilities for the outdoor play areas, the restroom, and the gymnasium located within the building. Distinct shall be responsible for the maintenance and all repairs to the building, to the heating system and other mechanical components of the building.
- 2. This agreement may be extended by the mutual agreement of both parties.

SECOND AMENDMENT TO COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT FOR IMPROVEMENTS AND USE OF THE SIERRAVILLE SCHOOL

This second amendment to the cooperative agreement for improvements to the Sierraville School is made and is effective March 5, 2013, by and between the County of Sierra, a political subdivision of the State of California ("County") and the Sierra Plumas Joint Unified School District ("District"), collectively the parties, and is intended to amend the original agreement between the parties dated May 2, 2006 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2006-103 (#060103) and the first amendment to this agreement dated September 21, 2010 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2010-127.

WHEREAS, the County of Sierra and the Sierra Plumas Joint Unified School District have in full force and effect, an existing Cooperative Use Agreement to facilitate the use by the County of State Park Bond Act funding for the Sierraville School Recreation Project, which agreement is dated May 2, 2006 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2006-103 (#060103), and amended by an agreement of the parties dated September 21, 2010, referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2010-127; and

WHEREAS, The Sierra Plumas Joint Unified School District has initiated a project to consolidate district staffing and will be relocating its District staff currently occupying the Sierraville School to Loyalton on or about July 1, 2013, with the result that the District will no longer be occupying or actively using any of the Sierraville School property. In recognition of the District's intent to remove its personnel from the Sierraville School property and its obligation to facilitate the County's use of said property in keeping with the County's expenditure of State Park Bond Act funds on said property, District has, except as otherwise provided for herein, offered to grant to County a right to use of the portions of Sierraville School property that were previously reserved to the District under the Cooperative Use Agreement (as referenced above). In consideration of the expanded right to use, County shall, except as otherwise provided for herein, assume responsibility for the costs of the utilities for the Sierraville School property.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual obligations, covenants, and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree to additional or amended provisions as follows:

- 1. Paragraph # 2 of Sierra County Agreement 2006-106 (#060103) entitled "Right to Use of School" is amended to read as follows:
 - District hereby grants to County a right to use the entire interior floor area of the Sierraville School, the exterior grounds (play field, parking lot, landscape area, recreational improvements), excepting therefrom the modular business office building, which use by County is more particularly described in Exhibit "A" as attached hereto and incorporated herein.
- 2. Exhibits "A" and "B" of Sierra County Agreement 2006-103 (#060103) are replaced by exhibits "A" and "B" attached hereto and incorporated herein.

- 3. In consideration for the expanded grant of use to County by District, County agrees to assume responsibility for usual and customary cost of monthly water service, garbage service, and electricity provided to the School property; provided however, that District shall be responsible for cost of electricity provided to the modular building on the property if used by District or leased or rented out by District to any other entity or person. County agrees to coordinate with any tenant of the modular building that District may secure to allow reasonable access to the School building for the sole purpose of accessing restrooms and the kitchen located therein, which may take the form of a separate agreement between the County and any such tenant. The form of the agreement shall be solely the responsibility of the County.
- 4. Except for the modular building, County shall be responsible for the day to day maintenance of the School building which maintenance shall consist of and be limited to customary janitorial services.
- 5. Other than County's responsibility as set out in paragraph # 4, above, District shall remain responsible for the maintenance and all repairs to the building, including without limitation, maintenance and repairs to the heating system and other mechanical components and building systems and for any exterior painting that may become necessary. Necessary repairs shall be made by District in a timely fashion so as to facilitate County's ongoing use of the property.
- 6. Any structural modifications or other improvements proposed by the County to the School building shall receive prior approval of the District. This does not include the use of portable and/or modular dividers that do not involve any structural modifications to install.
- 7. County shall allow the District the use of the multi-purpose room (gym and stage area) including appurtenant use of the restrooms and kitchen, for school-related events that the District may want to conduct at the School building so long as such use is not in conflict with County's use of the facility. The District shall clean the areas used within the School building upon termination of the event. The District shall make every effort to provide some form of offsetting remuneration for its use of the school building.
- 8. All other terms of Sierra County Agreement 2006-103 (#060103) dated May 2, 2006 and Sierra County Agreement 2010-127 dated September 21, 2010 shall remain in full force and effect.



THIRD AMENDMENT TO COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT FOR IMPROVEMENTS AND USE OF THE SIERRAVILLE SCHOOL

This third amendment to the cooperative agreement for improvements to the Sierraville School is made and is effective January 1, 2013, by and between the County of Sierra, a political subdivision of the State of California ("County") and the Sierra Plumas Joint Unified School District ("District"), collectively the parties, and is intended to amend the original agreement between the parties dated May 2, 2006 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2006-103 (#060103), the first amendment to this agreement dated September 21, 2010 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2010-127, and the second amendment to this agreement dated march 5, 2013 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2013-020.

WHEREAS, the County of Sierra and the Sierra Plumas Joint Unified School District have in full force and effect, an existing Cooperative Use Agreement to facilitate the use by the County of State Park Bond Act funding for the Sierraville School Recreation Project, which agreement is dated May 2, 2006 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2006-103 (#060103), and amended by an agreement of the parties dated September 21, 2010, referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2010-127 and further amended by agreement dated March 5, 2013 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2013-020; and,

WHEREAS, the Sierra Plumas Joint Unified School District no longer intends to make use of the modular units previously excepted from the County's right to use of the school under the agreement dated March 5, 2013 and referenced as Sierra County Agreement 2013-020.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual obligations, covenants, and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree to additional or amended provisions as follows:

- 1. County's right to use and improvement of the Sierraville School site shall encompass the entirety of the premises and shall no longer be limited to those particularized portions of the School set forth in Exhibit A, Exhibit B, Paragraph 2, or any other section of Sierra County Agreement 2006-103 or any amendment thereto.
- 2. Rental Payments to County for use of the premises shall be maintained by County in a trust fund, the use of which shall be for the operations and routine maintenance of the premises and any capital improvements that may be mutually agreed upon by the parties. Notwithstanding the foregoing, rental payments solely from the use of the modular office building shall be maintained in a trust account and twenty percent (20%) of said rental payments may be transferred and used by District for major repairs and maintenance including replacing any equipment or mutually agreed upon improvements.
- 3. All other terms of Sierra County Agreement 2006-103 (#060103) dated May 2, 2006, Sierra County Agreement 2010-127 dated September 21, 2010, and Sierra County Agreement 2013-020 dated march 5, 2013 shall remain in full force and effect.



Global Issues & Model UN Course District-Wide High School Elective

Training: Anna Thorell & Niecea Freeman were trained by Best Delegate through district funding in July 2020

Curriculum: Many resources are free and the curriculum needed for A-G approval can be piloted at a low cost (request funding from the Sierra Schools Foundation).

Course can be taken 4 years as an elective—proposing that it can possibly receive credit for history as well ("a" in A-G)—with rotating topics on global issues and international politics/policies.

2. Course Description

a. Course Overview:

Global Issues & Model UN is an elective with strong themes of science (environmental) and social studies (human/cultural geography, politics, government, international policy) that enables students to develop an in-depth understanding the planet on which they live, the systems that shape it, and the influence of human activity on those systems. This course is aligned with the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) and California State Standards for History (as well CCSS in English and cross cutting concepts for Social Studies) by providing students the opportunity to engage in in-depth studies of the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the practices of the United Nations throughout the year. The course emphasizes engaging students through exploration of global issues impacted by human activity with emphasis and case studies in areas around (Year 1): 1 Habitat Preservation, 2. Climate Change, 3. Energy Resources, (Year 2): 1. Globalization, 2. Water Resources, 3. Food Supply, (Year 3): 1. Health, 2. Pollution 3. Human rights, (Year 4): 1. Overpopulation, 2. Migration, 3. Standard of Living or any combination thereof, at the teacher's discretion. One of the main purposes of Model UN is not just to raise awareness about global issues, but to teach students to bring action to the local community. One service learning project (community service) each year will be planned and carried out in detail in response to local needs that align with SDGs. This elective expands on US issues and history to "expect students to analyze the changing political relationships within and among other countries and regions of the world, both throughout history and within the context of contemporary global interdependence" (CA State Standards, Social Studies).

EXAMPLE YEAR 1:

b. Course Content:

Unit 1: Model UN & the Sustainable Development Goals

Summary: Students will learn about the history of the United Nations: events that led to its inception, its purpose, general functions of the UN, and various UN initiatives such as the UNESCO World Heritage project & Sustainable Development Goals. Students will be asked to engage in an exploration of the SDGs and discuss the importance of international/global citizenship and the importance of the UN in facilitating equity across the world.

California State Social Studies Standards:

- 10.9 Students analyze the international developments in the post–World War II world.
 - 8. Discuss the establishment and work of the United Nations and the purposes and functions of the Warsaw Pact, SEATO, NATO, and the Organization of American States.
- 11.9 Students analyze U.S. foreign policy since World War II.
 1. Discuss the establishment of the United Nations and International Declaration of Human Rights, International Monetary Fund, World Bank, and General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) and their importance in shaping modern Europe and maintaining peace and international order. California Department of Education Created May 18, 2000 52 GRADE ELEVEN 2. Understand the role of military alliances, including NATO and SEATO, in deterring communist aggression and maintaining security during the Cold War.
- 11.11 Students analyze the major social problems and domestic policy issues in contemporary American society.

<u>Example Assignment</u>: Students will create a timeline presentation or poster to illustrate the genesis of the United Nations—highlighting its purpose and mission and how past and current events are relevant to its cause.

For UN Day (October 24th) students will work collaboratively to create a display that communicates the SDGs to the student body and/or community, with detailed and informational posters or interactive models/dioramas that showcase all 17 goals.

Example Model UN task: Students will become familiar with the processes of Model UN and how to attend a conference and practice procedures internally within the class with projects like: Fruit vs. Vegetables, with the resolution being forming committees to "make a salad". Students will be tested on protocol, vocabulary, and present their resolution as a performance task for this element of the class.

Unit 2: Habitat Preservation

Summary: For plants and animals, every place on Earth is a home, or habitat, which provides food, water, and shelter. Yet scientists are finding that habitats for many animals and plants around the world are shrinking. As a result, their populations are declining. The trend is a challenge of biodiversity, which is the range of living things on Earth. The Habitat Preservation unit explores how countries around the world are using conservation and a smarter use of resources to protect the habitats of living things. Students will explore issues around land use and conservation in case studies with countries such as Papua New Guinea, Madagascar, Kenya,

Namibia, Australia, Antarctica, and more. Vocabulary: habitat preservation, cloud forest, biodiversity, overpopulation, slash-burn agriculture, savanna, primate, drought, pesticides, coral polyps, invasive species, sediment, marsupials.

California State Social Studies Standards:

- 11.11 Students analyze the major social problems and domestic policy issues in contemporary American society.
 - 5. Trace the impact of, need for, and controversies associated with <u>environmental</u> <u>conservation</u>, <u>expansion</u> of the national park system, and the development of <u>environmental protection laws</u>, with <u>particular attention</u> to the interaction between <u>environmental protection</u> advocates and property rights advocates.
- 12.3 Students analyze the influence of the federal government on the American economy.
 - 1. Understand how the role of government in a market economy often includes providing for national defense, <u>addressing environmental concerns</u>, defining and enforcing property rights, attempting to make markets more competitive, and protecting consumers' rights.
 - 2. Identify the factors that may cause the costs of government actions to outweigh the benefits.

NGSS Standards:

- HSESS3-3. Create a computational simulation to illustrate the relationships among the management of natural resources, the sustainability of human populations, and biodiversity. [Clarification Statement: Examples of factors that affect the management of natural resources include costs of resource extraction and waste management, per-capita consumption, and the development of new technologies. Examples of factors that affect human sustainability include agricultural efficiency, levels of conservation, and urban planning.] [Assessment Boundary: Assessment for computational simulations is limited to using provided multi-parameter programs or constructing simplified spreadsheet calculations.]
- HS-LS2- Design, evaluate, and refine a solution for reducing the impacts of human
 activities on the environment and biodiversity.* [Clarification Statement: Examples of human activities can include urbanization, building dams, and dissemination of invasive species.]
- Create or revise a simulation to test a solution to mitigate adverse impacts of human activity on biodiversity.* [Clarification Statement: Emphasis is on testing solutions for a proposed problem related to threatened or endangered species, or to genetic variation of organisms for multiple species.]

<u>Example Assignment</u>: After exploring the case studies and learning basic definitions of habitat preservation, students will create a Public Service Announcement (PSA) about one of their case studies, illustrating their knowledge on the subject and creating a "call-to-action". Students will then be given a country to explore individually as the research component for their Model UN task and must write a 5-page research paper about the country's policies and attitudes toward habitat preservation.

<u>Example Model UN Activity</u>: Students will engage in a class-wide Model UN Conference and go through the process of creating a resolution that meets the various needs of the countries present

to push for the conservation of our world's natural resources and protect he biodiversity of the planet (while making economic and political concessions).

Unit 3: Climate Change

Summary: Students will engage in creative problem solving for the current climate issues caused by human activities such as energy use in transportation, production, and daily living. They will analyze their own habitats as well as case studies from around the globe to cultivate a mindfulness of energy use (CO2) and how it impacts the climate and the world. Students will understand that We can reduce the effects of climate change by switching to renewable energy sources and leaning away from carbon-based energy. Daily uses of water, electricity and transportation can also reduce carbon emissions and the effects of climate change. Humans will be impacted by climate change through loss of habitat, extinction of species, and loss of lifestyle and standards of living, among many other things. Specific vocabulary to engage in writing, discussions and presentations about climate, weather, renewable energy, carbon-based energy, biofuels and fossil fuels, and the heat capacity of the ocean. Students will be skilled at...

- Identifying carbon-based resources and biofuels.
- Describing the process of renewable energy resources: solar energy, hydropower, geothermal, and wind.
- Reflecting on personal energy use.
- Analyzing the Case Studies to identify climate issues and create solutions.
- Interpreting images, charts, and graphs to learn about the effects of climate change over time.

Examples of natural hazards can be from interior processes (such as volcanic eruptions and earthquakes), surface processes (such as tsunamis, mass wasting and soil erosion), and severe weather (such as hurricanes, floods, and droughts). Examples of the results of changes in climate that can affect populations or drive mass migrations include changes to sea level, regional patterns of temperature and precipitation, and the types of crops and livestock that can be raised.]

Climate Summit Role play: Write a Speech as a government official at a Climate Summit that explains why we must actively fight climate change and provide a list of solutions specific to your country's resources and capabilities to contribute to the cause: Australia, Costa Rica, Guatemala, Haití, Puerto Rico, USA.

Example Model UN Activity: Students will engage district-wide on a topic related to Climate Change for a conference. Each student will do an in-depth research paper 3-5 pages on their assigned country and their attitude and policies around Climate Change. Students will then participate on behalf of their nation in the district-wide conference in order to create a resolution that impacts as many countries as possible while still considering the economic and ideological needs of other nations.

Unit 4: Energy Resources

Summary: Energy use is one of the key issues of our time. People have traditionally relied on fossil fuels, including oil, coal, and natural gas. There are growing concerns, though, about the pollution caused by these energy resources. In addition, these sources of energy are nonrenewable. That is, they can be used up. Countries around the world are exploring ways to use renewable sources of energy, such as solar power. Energy Resources examines the role of traditional sources of energy and the development of alternative energy resources.

[Clarification Statement: Examples of Earth systems to be considered are the hydrosphere, atmosphere, cryosphere, geosphere, and/or biosphere. <u>Example Assignment</u>: Renewable Energy Action Plan presentations with Google Slides or PowerPoint by leveled groups: The Caribbean, Guatemala, and Costa Rica—case studies from the text.

Example Model UN Activity: Students will engage in a regional or inter-district conference on a topic related to sustainable energy technologies and resources. Each student will do an in-depth research paper 3-5 pages on their assigned country and their attitude and policies around energy resources. Students will then participate on behalf of their nation in the district-wide conference in order to create a resolution that impacts as many countries as possible while still considering the economic and ideological needs of other nations.
