Injury to the head can be serious and symptoms of injury may not begin to appear until sometime after the actual accident. All head injuries should be watched closely for at least 24 hours. You may allow your child to sleep, but check your child periodically that first night. He/she should wake up, walk and talk normally.

Contact your family physician immediately if your child has any of the following symptoms:

SIGNS OBSERVED BY PARENTS OR GUARDIANS
Appears dazed or stunned
•Is confused about events
• Answers questions slowly
•Repeats questions
•Can't recall events <i>prior</i> to the hit, bump, or fall
•Can't recall events <i>after</i> the hit, bump, or fall
•Loses consciousness (even briefly)
•Shows behavior or personality changes
• Forgets class schedule or assignments
SYMPTOMS REPORTED BY YOUR CHILD
Thinking/Remembering:
Difficulty thinking clearly
 Difficulty concentrating or remembering
•Feeling more slowed down
Feeling sluggish, hazy, foggy, or groggy
